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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established on September 19, 1981, Falakata College has emerged as a pivotal institution in North Bengal, making significant contributions to both co-education and sports. As a government-aided, permanently recognized degree college, it is affiliated with the University of North Bengal and is listed under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act. The college is managed by a Governing Body under the oversight of the Directorate of Public Instruction, West Bengal.

Located in Falakata, just 1 km from National Highway 17, the campus features a blend of modern and traditional architecture, comprising a two-story new building alongside an older, single-story structure, with a lush green playground at the center. The serene backdrop of a spacious green forest enhances the college's friendly and conducive atmosphere for teaching and learning.

Historically, Falakata was a sub-divisional town during British rule, but post-independence, the focus shifted to Alipurduar, leading to a gradual decline in Falakata's prominence. Surrounded by tea gardens and forests, and distanced from the district and sub-divisional town, residents faced challenges in accessing higher education. With a population predominantly composed of backward scheduled castes and scheduled tribes, many eager students found higher education beyond their reach. This highlighted the urgent need for a local college, resulting in the establishment of Falakata College in 1981. The institution was formally included under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act on May 28, 1988.

What began as a small initiative with just 50 to 60 students has blossomed into a vibrant educational hub, now serving thousands of students annually. The remarkable journey of Falakata College, from its humble beginnings to a flourishing institution, stands as a testament to its enduring commitment to education and community development.

Falakata College aims to provide a holistic education to its students, focusing on both curricular and extracurricular activities to promote an overall development. The college believes in the idea of participatory learning, encouraging the students to actively engage with classroom materials through debates, discussions and other interactive modes of learning. Following the path laid down by the National Education Policy, the college has also adopted the vocation-oriented system of education, focusing on the need to train the students for skill-based work. The college also promotes a multi-disciplinary approach to education by providing cross-departmental courses through MDC. This also ensures that the students get access to different approaches to issues of contemporary relevance. Through several community outreach programs and social welfare activities, Falakata College develops a system of education that is socially relevant. It inculcates a sense of social responsibility in the students and trains them to use their knowledge for the welfare of the community.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. The absence of a large auditorium limits the institution's capacity to effectively host cultural and academic events.
- 2. The expansive campus presents security challenges. While CCTV cameras are installed, their coverage is insufficient, and a shortage of security personnel complicates effective surveillance.
- 3. There is a need for further investment in modern teaching-learning technologies and ICT resources to meet current educational standards.
- 4. The rapid growth in student population demands additional classrooms and facilities, putting pressure on existing infrastructure.
- 5. Both teaching and non-teaching staff shortages exist, with slow government recruitment processes hindering the creation of essential positions.
- 6. Many students encounter financial difficulties, compounded by low parental education and awareness, which discourages the pursuit of higher education, especially for first-generation learners.
- 7. Insufficient faculty positions result in increased workloads, limiting teachers' engagement in research and impacting overall output.
- 8. Improvement is needed in student performance on national-level exams like NET/SET and other competitive assessments to enhance employment prospects.
- 9. There is a need for stronger alumni participation to bolster the college's resources and networks.
- 10. The lack of nearby industries and low engagement from existing businesses hampers the development of strong industry-institution partnerships.
- 11. More interdisciplinary research collaborations with other institutions and industries are essential for supporting institutional growth.
- 12. Limited interest from reputable organizations in providing on-campus consultative and placement opportunities restricts students' employment prospects.
- 13. Language barriers among many students diminish their employability, particularly in competitive job markets.
- 14. Increased funding is necessary to enhance infrastructure and address resource shortages vital for institutional development.

- 17. Conducting ICT-enabled training programs for non-teaching staff can improve operational efficiency.
- 18. Expanding the number of ICT-enabled classrooms is vital to support modern teaching methods.
- 19. Developing on-campus research opportunities can encourage faculty and students to engage in academic research, contributing to the institution's growth.

Curricular Aspects

Affiliated with North Bengal University (NBU), Falakata College is dedicated to providing holistic education that fosters responsible citizenship, advanced knowledge, and strong ethical values. Our faculty play a crucial role in curriculum development through active participation in the Board of Studies, ensuring their insights are integrated into the academic framework. The Academic Calendar, created by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) with institutional input, outlines key dates for sessions, examinations, holidays, and events, and is available on the college website. We adhere to this calendar, with deviations made only in exceptional circumstances, such as during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Each semester begins with departmental meetings to develop lesson plans, which are shared with students to promote transparency and accountability. The Routine Committee prepares a Master Routine that aligns with departmental priorities, ensuring a structured academic schedule. Timely syllabus completion is closely monitored through these plans.

Recent enhancements include a Learning Management System (LMS) that provides digital access to teaching materials, complemented by ICT tools and practical classes. We also offer tutorial and mentoring sessions to effectively support all learners. The College Library is equipped with extensive resources, including e-books, journals, and IT facilities.

Continuous evaluation is integrated into our teaching process through class tests, assignments, and student seminars. The Annual Test Examination prepares students for University exams, with results posted on departmental notice boards. Professional ethics are incorporated into various disciplines, equipping students with the necessary ethical insights.

We address gender issues through courses in Philosophy, Political Science, English, and other subjects, complemented by events organized by the Internal Complaints Committee and the National Service Scheme (NSS). Environmental consciousness is promoted through a mandatory Environmental Studies course and initiatives like cleanliness drives and tree planting.

Additionally, the College offers certificate and value-added courses, as well as online options through platforms like MOOCs, SWAYAM, and NPTEL, ensuring continuous improvement through collected feedback.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Falakata College, affiliated with North Bengal University (NBU), employs a holistic approach to assess and support student development through a variety of academic and extracurricular activities. Upon admission, students take a 'Student Aptitude Test' to evaluate their academic backgrounds. Advanced learners are given enhanced resources, such as e-journals and e-books via N-LIST, and encouraged to participate in SWAYAM, MOOCs, seminars, workshops, and teaching assistant roles. Slow learners receive regular mentoring, remedial classes, and tailored preparation for competitive exams, while parent-teacher meetings facilitate discussions on academic progress. The incorporation of ICT tools significantly enriches the learning experience, with departments organizing field trips, like geomorphic excursions, and maintaining facilities such as a medicinal plant garden. Digital resources are utilized for teaching, project work, and presentations, and the curriculum has adapted post-pandemic to include internships, apprenticeships, and resources for drama, language courses, and political science activities. The college clearly outlines Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) through syllabi and academic calendars, employing Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) methods, including seminars and class tests, along with semester exams. Regular feedback from students, teachers, alumni, and employers helps refine programs, while tracking student progression into higher education and employment rates assesses program effectiveness. Adhering to university regulations, the college ensures transparency in internal assessments, attendance tracking, and evaluations, overseen by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), which communicates results and feedback clearly to students and parents. Furthermore, Falakata College promotes holistic development through various clubs, centers, and outreach programs focused on environmental and social initiatives, all guided by its motto of "Discipline, Dedication & Determination." This integrated approach ensures that the college effectively supports student learning, development, and career readiness.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Falakata College has made remarkable progress in enhancing educational outcomes and community engagement through a range of initiatives designed to nurture entrepreneurial skills and foster practical innovation in collaboration with industry. The college's curriculum, aligned with the University syllabus and the UGC's Choice-Based Credit System, effectively merges regional and traditional knowledge with global perspectives. Subjects such as Sanskrit, Bengali, History, and Geography not only highlight Indian values but also emphasize practical applications, including biodiversity conservation and Ayurvedic medicinal plant knowledge.

Founded in 1981, Falakata College promotes experiential learning through its medicinal plant garden, reinforcing the importance of traditional knowledge in modern education. The institution is dedicated to preserving Indian cultural heritage, organizing seminars, cultural programs, and observances that celebrate this legacy. Additionally, the college raises awareness of Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) through seminars and

workshops, addressing critical issues related to IPR.

Community engagement is a cornerstone of Falakata College, with the National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC) providing students with opportunities to develop democratic values and participate in community service. Activities such as blood donation drives, COVID-19 relief efforts, environmental conservation initiatives, and educational seminars underscore the college's commitment to social responsibility. The NSS and NCC units have garnered numerous awards and certificates of appreciation for their impactful contributions, receiving recognition from local organizations and the Department of Youth Affairs.

The college also features two museums—the Local Culture Museum and the Museum of Natural History—which enhance the curriculum and help preserve historical knowledge. Overall, Falakata College's initiatives reflect a strong dedication to integrating traditional knowledge with modern innovation, fostering holistic education, and instilling a sense of social responsibility in its students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Falakata College, established on September 19, 1981, occupies a 6.38-acre campus and offers nine undergraduate programs in the Arts. The college is dedicated to enhancing its infrastructure, human resources, and learning resources, featuring well-ventilated classrooms, advanced laboratories, and two high-tech conference rooms. A significant asset is the library, which houses 20,980 books and over 6,000 online journals, with digital resources supported by N-LIST and Sage Publications.

Additional facilities include extensive computing resources, comprehensive Wi-Fi, fire safety measures, and eco-friendly features such as solar panels and a backup generator. The college is committed to sustainability, implementing rainwater harvesting, waste management, and air quality monitoring systems. Accessibility for differently-abled individuals is prioritized, alongside health services that include a gymnasium and yoga center, as well as unique facilities like an Oral Archive and a Medicinal Plant Garden.

The library utilizes KOHA software, providing access to over 20,980 books, 6,000 e-journals, and 799,500 e-books, including special collections featuring works of Nobel Laureates and rare texts on North Bengal. Investments in the library for 2022-2023 focused on subscriptions, new equipment, and automation enhancements, with plans to open the library to the public to encourage community engagement.

Technologically, the college maintains 228 computers with a robust Wi-Fi network offering 150 Mbps bandwidth. Seminar rooms are equipped for virtual classes, and specialized software supports various departments. The transition to a Learning Management System (LMS) has modernized educational delivery, while administrative functions are streamlined through software like ERP and a well-maintained website. The IT infrastructure is continuously updated, emphasizing cybersecurity and high standards of technological support.

Overall, Falakata College provides a robust educational environment, characterized by advanced facilities, extensive resources, and a strong commitment to technological excellence and sustainability.

Student Support and Progression

Falakata College is dedicated to enhancing student capabilities and addressing grievances through comprehensive support systems. Currently, 65 students benefit from scholarships and freeships provided by both the institution and the government. The college organizes a range of capacity-building activities, including training in soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills (such as yoga, physical fitness, health, and hygiene), and ICT/computing skills. Additionally, it offers guidance for competitive exams and career counseling to support student progression.

In terms of grievance redressal, the college adheres to statutory guidelines and maintains a zero-tolerance policy towards sexual harassment and ragging. Students can submit grievances both online and offline, with timely resolutions facilitated by appropriate committees. Over the past five years, the college has seen significant placements and advancements in student progression to higher education, with students excelling in state, national, and international examinations and securing 50 Plus awards and medals in sports and cultural activities.

The Falakata College Alumni Association, registered under the West Bengal Society Registration Act on 8th November2016, boasts over 500 active members. Initially starting with just 20 life members, the association is led by Principal Dr. Hirendra Nath Bhattacharjee and includes faculty and non-teaching staff. The association has played a crucial role in supporting the college, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic by contributing to campus maintenance. It also provides monetary awards to outstanding students and organizes successful alumni events, fostering networking and community engagement. Alumni frequently deliver motivational speeches, guide current students, and participate in cultural and sports events, reinforcing the college's traditions and sense of community.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Falakata College excels in educational quality and global competence through strategic planning and enhancement driven by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The IQAC oversees the annual strategic plan, focusing on quality improvements through diverse events, infrastructure upgrades, and rigorous annual reviews, including research promotion and student vulnerability surveys. Financial decisions are reviewed by the Finance Subcommittee and approved by the Governing Body. The Career Counselling Cell enhances student employability by facilitating industry interactions and organizing CSR-driven training programs and workshops. The college employs a robust auditing procedure comprising four layers: Internal Academic Audits conducted by Heads of Departments (HODs) and the IQAC, validated by the Principal; External Audits performed by external members reviewed by Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and the Director of the Malviya Mission Teacher Training Center; and Internal Administrative Audits managed by the Finance Subcommittee to ensure adherence to standards. Governance and administration fall under the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal, with the College Service Commission handling recruitment, appointments, and transfers according to West Bengal Service Rules (WBSR) and UGC guidelines for CAS benefits. The institutional structure is led by the Principal, supported by the IQAC, Teachers' Council, and College Office, with all permanent teachers included in the Teachers' Council, alongside contributions from HODs, the Head Assistant, and the Students' Union. Strategic initiatives during the COVID-19 pandemic included fee waivers and a free studentship scheme to assist economically disadvantaged students. Staff welfare programs for non-teaching staff offer subsidized medical facilities, maternity leave, financial support through loans and insurance, and educational opportunities, while teaching staff have access to financial support, ICT facilities, recreational amenities, and government benefits such as pensions and travel concessions. Financial

management ensures transparency through internal audits by the Bursar and Finance Committee, alongside external audits by a government-recommended auditor, with financial strategies and budgets developed in consultation with relevant committees. The IQAC has achieved several milestones, including student enrichment through a Language Lab, add-on courses, Skill-Hub, and the EWYL Program; e-resource upgrades with enhanced e-facilities and plans for a Multi-Media Studio; and quality assurance via regular audits and training programs. Additionally, faculty development and contributions to curriculum design, mentoring and skill enhancement courses for students, the implementation of a Learning Management System (LMS), vulnerability surveys, and a Digital Archival Centre for preserving local heritage underscore the college's commitment to continuous improvement and maintaining high standards.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Falakata College demonstrates a strong commitment to gender equity and holistic development through a variety of initiatives. The campus is designed to ensure a safe environment, featuring CCTV surveillance and a dedicated Girls' Common Room for comfort and security, alongside sanitary napkin vending machines to address menstrual health needs. The Internal Complaints and Anti-Sexual Harassment Cells provide confidential support for issues of sexual harassment, while student-led campaigns and events on Women's Day promote gender equality. Gender-related topics are integrated into the curriculum across various disciplines, and International Women's Day is celebrated with seminars and discussions, ensuring equal access to educational resources and encouraging female participation in leadership roles.

In addition to gender equity, the college prioritizes environmental sustainability through annual Green, Energy, and Environment Audits, maintaining an eco-friendly campus with waste segregation systems and sustainable practices. Accessibility for all is a priority, with facilities such as walkways, ramps, and toilets designed for differently-abled individuals. The institution fosters an inclusive environment through events dedicated to SC/ST, OBC, minority sections, and women, observed during initiatives like Communal Harmony Day and International Women's Day.

Furthermore, the college upholds a Code of Conduct for both teaching and non-teaching staff, ensuring accountability and professionalism. Social outreach is integral to the institution's mission, with the NSS Unit organizing regular activities and special camps that benefit the adopted village. These collective efforts align with Falakata College's commitment to academic excellence, environmental awareness, gender equity, social outreach, and community service, making it a beacon of holistic education and societal impact, fostering both personal and academic growth for its diverse student body.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Falakata College has adopted a holistic and multidisciplinary educational approach aimed at cultivating well-rounded personalities in our students. This methodology focuses on developing a diverse array of skills—academic, intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, and ethical—through a robust interdisciplinary framework. Various departments, including English, Bengali, Philosophy, History, and Political Science, collaborate actively to create a dynamic learning environment. Faculty exchanges and joint classes with other Language and Literature Departments enrich the educational experience and foster collaborative learning. For instance, our Philosophy department offers the lecture series "Beyond Curriculum," designed to broaden knowledge across disciplines. The English department enhances course offerings with add-on programs like 'Literature and Performance Studies,' expanding learning opportunities for students. Additionally, several Humanities departments contribute to the curriculum through certificate courses and specialized programs focused on skill development and humanitarian growth. In alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP), the college has introduced vocational and professional training courses in areas such as Yoga and Self-Defense, highlighting their interdisciplinary nature. Our Career Counselling Cell conducts workshops and seminars to prepare students for the demands of the job market, while our NSS and NCC units actively instill a sense of social responsibility among students. Our strategic objective is to integrate this multidisciplinary approach across all undergraduate programs, encompassing basic, professional, and vocational disciplines. We are particularly keen on expanding areas such as Languages, Literature, Philosophy, Arts, Cultural and Social Activities, ICTbased learning, Sociology, Sports, Translation, and Interpretation. These fields are crucial for fostering a holistic educational environment that stimulates comprehensive student development. Furthermore, the college plans to leverage open and distance learning (ODL) modes to complement our existing semester-based offerings. We are also dedicated to facilitating practical learning experiences through internships with local industries and businesses, thereby enhancing students' practical knowledge and employability, and effectively preparing them for

their future careers.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Falakata College is embracing a blended learning approach, enabling students to earn credits from various accredited higher education institutions through platforms such as SWAYAM, MOOCs, and NPTEL. The college actively encourages both faculty and students to register and participate in these national schemes, thereby enhancing their academic and practical knowledge. While awaiting authorization from relevant authorities, we have initiated discussions with our affiliating university to incorporate the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) into our skill-oriented programs as a preliminary step. Additionally, we have signed Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) with several institutions and are exploring both traditional and online channels to maximize the benefits of the ABC for our students and those from other colleges under a unified system. Implementing the ABC at the degree level will require extensive collaboration among institutions and regulatory bodies. This initiative has the potential to revolutionize credit transfers across universities and recognize credits earned through non-traditional courses. Falakata College has partnered with various academic and research institutes to offer a range of certificate programs and value-added courses, aligning with the core objectives of the ABC. The admission advisory from our affiliating university has highlighted the potential introduction of the ABC, emphasizing its importance in modernizing and enhancing the flexibility of higher education. To facilitate this, Falakata College has established its own digital locker system, actively preparing for the implementation of the ABC as outlined in the National Education Policy. This flexible academic structure will allow undergraduate students multiple entry and exit points during their courses, enabling them to balance education with employment opportunities and potentially reducing dropout rates. Under the ABC scheme, students can exit a program after achieving any qualification level and later return to complete their studies within a specified timeframe. We have already begun collecting necessary details from students, laying the groundwork for a smooth transition to the ABC system. Since 2021, we have also been considering forming clusters with other colleges to enhance

benefits for our students and facilitate the introduction of the ABC through these collaborative efforts. By registering on e-learning platforms such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, and other MOOC sites, our students are positioned to gain significant advantages. Furthermore, many of our faculty members have enrolled on these platforms to mentor and assist students in their academic pursuits, enriching our educational environment. The implementation of the ABC system at Falakata College represents a transformative step toward a more flexible and inclusive educational framework. By embracing blended learning, enhancing credit transfer mechanisms, and fostering collaborations, we aim to provide our students with a robust, adaptable, and comprehensive education that prepares them effectively for the future.

3. Skill development:

The National Education Policy (NEP) emphasizes the holistic development of youth, aiming to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio and enhance skill development to support the objectives of Atmanirbhar Bharat. Our institution, in collaboration with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), has made significant strides in this direction by introducing various initiatives designed to enrich both knowledge and soft skills among students. We have implemented a range of skill development activities, including spot reading, grooming sessions for language skills, and debate competitions. These activities are essential for integrating the diverse skills necessary to secure and retain employment and excel in professional settings. Our career counselors assist students in effectively incorporating these skills into their resumes. Additionally, we promote life skills through accessible courses in yoga, creating diverse opportunities in the job market and enhancing our students' employability. Our curriculum is tailored to meet the practical demands of various careers, offering entrepreneurship opportunities, internships, and experiential learning through certificate programs and fieldwork. The college also empowers students through comprehensive career services and hosts workshops, training camps, and seminars aimed at fostering professionalism and a passion for skill acquisition. Recently, our Career Counseling and Placement Cell, guided by the IQAC, organized two week-long skill development programs

in collaboration with local organizations, including Rice, Gen Next Information Technology, and Anudeep Foundation. These partnerships reflect our commitment to providing practical experiences, further enhanced by collaborations with businesses in the skill sector. In mentoring sessions, students receive tailored guidance to develop skills that improve their employability prospects. Our institution prioritizes skill development through partnerships with reputable academic and business organizations, fostering a proactive and forwardthinking approach. Furthermore, life skills activities such as gymnasium sessions and yoga contribute to students' mental strength, health, and positive outlook, creating well-rounded individuals prepared for future challenges.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Falakata College is committed to promoting the growth and preservation of Indian languages and culture while ensuring their vibrancy and relevance. We prioritize the use of the mother tongue as a medium of instruction, alongside English, to enhance the global reach of Indian languages. Our curriculum includes twenty-seven diverse courses, with a special focus on Sanskrit and Philosophy, exploring foundational texts of the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) such as the Vedas, Upanishads, and Bhagavad Gita. Emphasizing a holistic educational approach, we promote physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual growth through programs in Yoga, Meditation, and Self-Defense, as well as Certificate/Add-on/Valueadded courses like Painting and Art. Recognized by the University of North Bengal, we are also planning to establish a Research Centre dedicated to IKS. Our honors courses in Political Science, History, Geography, and Sociology foster an understanding of diverse philosophical viewpoints and encourage intellectual coexistence, while departments like Economics and Political Science help students grasp varied economic and geopolitical contexts. By integrating new concepts and technological advances with foundational values, we offer a total of eighteen Certificate/Add-on/Value-added courses that cultivate an appreciation for Indian heritage and professional skill development. Through this comprehensive educational approach, Falakata College prepares students to thrive in diverse environments and contribute meaningfully to both

	local and global communities.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Falakata College embraces Outcome-Based Education (OBE) as a transformative approach that prioritizes learner-centered methods and focuses on achieving specific learning outcomes. In line with the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP), our college implements the Four Year Undergraduate Programm (FYUGP) to cater to the diverse interests and skills of learners, fostering innovative and participative learning processes. Our educational framework segments the learning process into planning, doing, checking, and acting, aligning academic plans with the college's mission and the objectives of North Bengal University through clearly defined Course Outcomes (COs) and Programme Outcomes (POs). We utilize various interactive teaching methods, such as ICT-based instruction, seminars, workshops, and student-led presentations, to promote critical thinking and flexibility. Continuous assessment and feedback from both students and teachers are integral to refining our curriculum delivery, ensuring that educational objectives are met effectively. To maintain high academic standards, we engage in regular curriculum mapping and formative assessments, while our mentor-mentee system provides personalized guidance to track student progress. Through these comprehensive strategies, Falakata College aims to nurture students into rational individuals with a deep understanding of themselves and their cultural contexts, significantly contributing to national integration and personal growth.
6. Distance education/online education:	During the pandemic, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of Falakata College championed online education to ensure operational readiness. In response, we established dedicated departmental unit to enhance the deployment of various digital educational tools and resources. Key initiatives included online classes via the G Suite platform, remote assessments, centralized digital repositories, and comprehensive student support services through a Learning Management System (LMS). Additionally, we provide resources like MCQ preparation and host Open University Study Centers

affiliated with Rabindra Bharati University, which offer flexible learning opportunities. Students benefit

from synchronous virtual classrooms and hybrid courses that blend online learning with traditional methods. Looking ahead, Falakata College plans to further integrate digital learning by conducting workshops connected to Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) in collaboration with leading platforms. To replicate the collaborative experience of in-person classrooms, we've created virtual environments for real-time discussions and group activities, ensuring rigorous educational standards. Our commitment to advancing online education highlights our dedication to maintaining continuity and flexibility, preparing students for future challenges through a robust and inclusive educational experience.

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

Falakata College has established a formal Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) and enhances its initiatives through additional electoral literacy programs led by the Political Science department. The college actively observes significant events like Voters' Day and Constitution Day, engaging ELC members in campaigns that promote the importance of voting and understanding the political system. These initiatives aim to educate both students and the local community about the right to vote and the process of enrolling in electoral rolls. By fostering a deeper understanding of democratic participation and civic responsibility, Falakata College aims to empower individuals to engage meaningfully in the electoral process.

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

Falakata College recognizes the vital role of electoral literacy in fostering an informed and responsible electorate. Our commitment is embodied in the Electoral Literacy Club (ELC), which operates in a neutral and nonpartisan manner to uphold the integrity of the electoral process. The ELC serves as a representative body, with selected departments and cells nominating students to engage in discussions on broader sociopolitical issues, thereby nurturing a democratic ethos among the student body. While all students are members of the ELC, specific individuals serve as representatives. The primary objective of the ELC is to cultivate a thorough

understanding of democratic processes among students. Through various activities and discussions, the club prepares students to be active, informed, and conscientious participants in electoral systems at both local and national levels.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) at Falakata College is dedicated to fostering civic awareness and promoting active participation in democratic processes, in alignment with guidelines from the Election Commission of India (ECI) and the District Election Officer (DEO) of Alipurduar. Key initiatives include voter registration drives and empowerment programs, educating students and local community members about their rights and responsibilities as voters. In collaboration with the Department of Parliamentary Affairs, Government of West Bengal, the ELC organizes a Youth Parliament, allowing students to debate national and international issues while simulating parliamentary procedures. The club also celebrates National Voters Day each year with workshops, guest lectures, and interactive sessions that highlight the importance of civic engagement. In addition to educational initiatives, the ELC encourages students to actively contribute to the electoral process. This includes assisting with voter registration drives and supporting the district election administration during polling. The club is also involved in voter awareness campaigns that promote ethical voting practices and aim to ensure the participation of marginalized groups, including transgender individuals, commercial sex workers, persons with disabilities, and senior citizens. Collaborating with the NSS unit of Falakata College and the Alipurduar Election Office, the ELC recently organized an awareness program for newly eligible 18+ voters, reinforcing its commitment to civic education and participation in the democratic process.

4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.

The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) of Falakata College collaborates closely with the District Election Office to enhance community engagement in the electoral process, particularly focusing on voter registration and enrollment. The ELC assists with voter registration drives by having faculty and student volunteers provide hands-on support to community members, helping them accurately fill out registration forms, understand required documentation, and address any questions about the

electoral process. Additionally, the ELC organizes awareness meetings on campus, featuring educational presentations on voter registration procedures, the significance of each vote, and an overview of the electoral process. These meetings also include interactive sessions where students can engage with election officials to clarify their doubts. The club sets up registration booths to guide eligible students through the registration process, thereby promoting a deeper understanding of democratic responsibilities. Through these initiatives, the ELC aims to foster a more informed and active electorate, which is essential for sustaining the democratic fabric of society.

5. Extent of students above 18 years who are yet to be enrolled as voters in the electoral roll and efforts by ELCs as well as efforts by the College to institutionalize mechanisms to register eligible students as voters.

Nearly all students at Falakata College who are 18 years and older are registered voters. The college regularly invites resource persons from the District Election Office to engage with students and enhance their understanding of electoral processes. These sensitization programs consistently achieve positive outcomes, effectively raising awareness about voting rights and responsibilities among the student body.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Falakata College, affiliated with the University of North Bengal, is committed to fostering holistic education that shapes responsible citizens equipped with advanced knowledge and strong moral values. We prioritize meticulous academic planning, creating an inclusive learning environment, and ongoing evaluation to support all students, particularly those from diverse backgrounds.

Our faculty actively participates in curriculum development through their roles on the Board of Studies, ensuring that their insights contribute to shaping the curriculum framework. The Academic Calendar, prepared by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in collaboration with institutional authorities, aligns with the university's guidelines and is accessible on the college website. It includes key dates for the commencement of sessions, internal examinations, holidays as per the Government of West Bengal's Holiday List, and important institutional events such as College Foundation Day, Annual Sports Day, and Annual Prize Day. The calendar also details vacations and session breaks, though deviations are made only under special circumstances, such as during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Each semester, the Routine Committee prepares the Master Routine, incorporating departmental priorities for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses. Academic sessions begin with departmental meetings to allocate topics and develop lesson plans in accordance with the course structure. Faculty members, in consultation with department heads, create detailed teaching plans and share them with students at the start of each semester, outlining syllabus coverage. These plans and class records are meticulously maintained to ensure that the syllabus is completed within the designated timeframe.

Recently, we have enhanced our teaching methodologies by integrating a Learning Management System (LMS), providing digital access to teaching plans and materials. In addition to traditional instructional methods, we utilize ICT tools, audio-visual aids, and PowerPoint presentations. Regular practical classes are conducted for laboratory-based subjects, and tutorial sessions, along with specialized classes for slow learners, are organized as needed. Mentoring sessions are also available to address any academic challenges students may face.

The College Library offers a wealth of resources, including automated mail services for question papers, study materials, PowerPoint presentations, e-books, journals, magazines, theses, dissertations, and learning videos. It also provides IT facilities such as scanners and printers.

Continuous evaluation is an integral part of our teaching-learning process, incorporating class tests, assignment submissions, and student seminars. An Annual Test Examination precedes the university's semester exams, with results posted on departmental notice boards. We encourage students to participate

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Falakata College is dedicated to integrating critical cross-cutting themes such as Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability into its curriculum in collaboration with the University of North Bengal. These themes play a pivotal role in shaping students' perspectives, values, and behaviors, both personally and professionally.

At the University of North Bengal, professional ethics are integral to the educational framework, especially in programs that emphasize community ethics and environmental communication. Ethical considerations in media are explored, while gender issues are examined across disciplines like Political Science, Philosophy, and History. Philosophy and Education courses incorporate human values, focusing on ethics and peace education. Environmental sustainability is embedded in courses such as Geography, addressing topics like ecology and renewable energy. A mandatory Environmental Studies course ensures that all students engage with sustainability issues.

The National Service Scheme (NSS) and the National Cadet Corps (NCC) support community welfare and environmental awareness through initiatives like tree planting and essential goods distribution, fostering civic duty and environmental stewardship. To address these cross-cutting issues, the college organizes a week-long Value Orientation Course at the beginning of each academic session. This course allows new students to engage with resource persons on ethical topics and participate in discussions aimed at moral upliftment.

Professional ethics are emphasized across various subjects. For example, the Sanskrit and Arabic departments focus on ethics as a core aspect of their curriculum, while the Physical Education department and the Yoga center host workshops and training programs on Intellectual Property Rights to promote professional ethics. Gender concerns are addressed in courses across disciplines, including Political Science, Philosophy, English, Bengali, and History, covering topics such as Gender Rights, Social Issues, Domestic Violence, Feminism, Ecofeminism, Women's Education, Inequality, and Women Empowerment. The Internal Complaints Committee celebrates International Women's Day with seminars, participatory activities, and discussions featuring prominent speakers on gender-related issues.

The NSS and NCC also conduct awareness programs for local communities, focusing on personal hygiene, nutrition, and health. Human values are integrated into various disciplines, with Political Science addressing social and political communication, social changes, and social problems. Language departments explore themes of Humanism, ethical debates around euthanasia and suicide, and social and political philosophy. Human Geography discusses social processes and well-being. Special lectures and NSS activities, including flood relief and donations, further promote human values.

Environmental and sustainability issues are covered through disciplines like Political Science, Geography, and Economics. The curriculum includes Environmental Studies as an AECC paper, covering topics such as pollution, hazards, Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA), and sustainable

development. Seminars, online workshops, and webinars are organized to celebrate World Environment Day and other relevant occasions, enhancing awareness of environmental issues.

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

After admission, Falakata College conducts a 'Student Aptitude Test' to assess students' academic, social, and intellectual backgrounds. Faculty evaluate student competence through academic performance, classroom interactions, and active participation in discussions.

Advanced learners identified during this process gain access to a wealth of resources, including ejournals and advanced e-books via N-LIST, as well as online resources recommended by departmental faculty. These students are encouraged to enroll in SWAYAM and MOOC courses, participate in student seminars, quizzes, debates, group discussions, and take on teaching assistant roles in practical classes. They also contribute to wall magazines and engage in poster competitions and model exhibitions.

The library provides career guidance materials and resources for entrance and competitive exams, with faculty actively promoting their use among advanced learners. Regular mentoring sessions are held for slow learners to address academic challenges, with issues discussed in class and strategies developed based on internal assessments. Remedial classes and supplementary books are offered to support these students, along with special classes for competitive exams such as NET, SLET, SET, NIMCET, GATE, and CUET. Parent-teacher meetings are scheduled as needed to discuss academic progress and resolve any concerns.

The integration of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools has significantly enhanced the teaching and learning experience. Departments organize field trips and excursions to complement the curriculum. Teachers utilize ICT tools for information gathering from e-journals and public domain resources, while GPS monitoring and geo-tagging improve field study documentation.

Post-pandemic, the college has incorporated internships and apprenticeship projects. The English and Bengali-Sanskrit departments offer language learning courses, while Political Science organizes Youth Parliament Competitions using PowerPoint. Participative learning is further encouraged through industrial site visits, science exhibitions, poster-making events, seminars, student presentations, and project work. The History Department's Museum fosters critical thinking, and clubs such as the Eco Club, Unity Club, and Science Club support participative learning.

The institution also promotes outreach programs, including tree plantation and cleanliness drives through the National Service Scheme, fostering environmental awareness and social responsibility. During and after the pandemic, students participated in certificate courses on ICT and Functional English, along with seminars, workshops, and webinars. Teachers employed various ICT tools, such as PowerPoint, G Suite, and Learning Management Systems (LMS), for class presentations and teaching plans. Online class tests were conducted through Continuous Internal Assessment.

To enhance teachers' knowledge of advanced software, online training sessions were arranged. Learning materials are accessible on the college website, and resources are shared through WhatsApp. The library features an automated, Wi-Fi-enabled system with QR-enabled web OPAC, e-sodhsindhu membership, and cloud-based Integrated Library Management Systems (ILMS), significantly enriching the e-learning environment. Regular user orientation and empowerment programs on Open Educational Resources (OERs) and digital learning technologies are conducted, steadily transforming the library into a vibrant Information Centre.

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

Falakata College, affiliated with the University of North Bengal, strictly follows university regulations regarding examination and evaluation, prioritizing transparency and fairness. Since the introduction of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2019, internal evaluations for non-practical subjects account for 36% of the total marks, structured as follows: 8% for attendance, 12% for Internal Assessment (IA) exams, and 16% for tutorial examinations. For practical subjects, 30% of the marks are allocated to practical exams, with 20% for attendance and 12% for IA.

Departments maintain monthly attendance records, regularly updating students and reaching out to those

with low attendance to offer guidance and support. The college adheres to the internal and tutorial examination patterns prescribed by the University of North Bengal, conducting internal assessments centrally. Faculty members submit marks, which are meticulously recorded by the college. Tutorial examinations employ various assessment methods, including term papers, projects, written tests, group discussions, and presentations, with variations depending on the department. Regular class tests and remedial classes are organized to monitor and support student progress.

The Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) system is designed for flexibility, enabling departments to schedule internal class tests and select appropriate evaluation methods. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the college adapted by conducting assessments online to ensure timely submission of marks. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), in collaboration with stakeholders, implements improvements such as project-based evaluations, group discussions, seminar presentations, and surveys from departmental excursions.

The CIA tests are supervised by the Central Examination Sub-committee, which is responsible for preparing and evaluating question papers, providing feedback on assessed scripts, and displaying marks on departmental notice boards to maintain transparency. Attendance concessions are granted for medical reasons, and arrangements are made for students unable to attend exams due to valid circumstances. Monthly attendance records are communicated to students and parents as needed. Internal marks, derived from Continuous Evaluation (CE) and attendance, significantly influence final results. Any grievances related to internal examinations are addressed by the Grievance Redressal sub-committee, which sees minimal complaints due to careful evaluation and prompt feedback.

For external/university exams, the college ensures strict compliance with University norms for Semester Examinations, including timely enrolment, issuance of admit cards, and adherence to the university timetable through a Central Examination sub-committee. Mark sheets, detailing SGPA and CGPA, are issued promptly following examinations. University-appointed faculty evaluate answer scripts, and any grievances are reported to the University for review. The college facilitates Post Publication Review (PPR) and Post Publication Scrutiny (PPS) to address external exam-related grievances promptly, thereby alleviating student stress. The semester system fosters regularity and a seamless teaching-learning process, ensuring a comprehensive and equitable evaluation of students' academic performance.

- Semester Examination Performance: Performance in semester examinations, encompassing both formative and summative assessments, serves as a direct measure of the attainment of Specific Course Objectives (COs). Grades reflect students' achievements throughout the course and are analyzed to assess the effectiveness of the curriculum.

Indirect Methods:

- Robust Feedback Mechanism: The college implements a comprehensive feedback system that involves students, alumni, and employers. Feedback is collected annually and reviewed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), covering teaching performance, curriculum delivery, and institutional resources. • Placement and Employability: Employability and placement rates are crucial indicators of learning outcomes. The college supports students through internships and career counseling provided by the Career Counseling and Placement Cell. Successful internships and off-campus placements reflect the effectiveness of the educational program.

- Attainment Level Score: The attainment level score for each course is calculated by combining 80% from direct methods and 20% from indirect methods, based on teacher assessments and feedback responses. This comprehensive evaluation strategy ensures that Falakata College continuously enhances its educational practices and effectively supports student development.

Seminar rooms have been upgraded to facilitate virtual classes, and the entire campus benefits from comprehensive Wi-Fi connectivity via thirty-three access points, providing robust bandwidth that has recently been enhanced from 100 Mbps to 150 Mbps with an optical fiber network.

Library and Specialized Software

The library has implemented the cloud version of KOHA for enhanced accessibility, and various specialized software programs support departmental needs. For example, the Geography Department utilizes advanced UGIS software, while the Department of English employs ORELL Software for its Language Lab.

Learning Management and Administrative Systems

Falakata College has transitioned from traditional teaching aids to a comprehensive Learning Management System (LMS), modernizing the educational delivery process. An online admission system streamlines key processes such as mark submission, result declaration, and the generation of internal examination marksheets and attendance reports. Examination software ensures the smooth conduct of university exams. Regular online feedback from stakeholders informs ongoing improvements, keeping the college responsive to changing needs.

Office and Website Management

Administrative operations are streamlined using office software like Tally ERP. The college website is meticulously maintained and updated under an annual contract with Gen Next Information Technology, ensuring it serves as a reliable information hub for students, faculty, and stakeholders.

Pandemic Response and IT Integration

The pandemic has accelerated the integration of IT into teaching and learning. The college adopted platforms like Google Classroom and Google Forms for online exams, minimizing health risks. G-Suite licenses were purchased to facilitate webinars and special lectures during this period. IT support is extended to study and research materials for both students and faculty, with ample desktops, laptops, scanners, LCD projectors, and laser printers available in all departments and the library. A dedicated student corner with reprographic facilities supports library usage.

Enhanced Connectivity and Facilities

BSNL wireless internet (Wi-Fi) ensures comprehensive coverage across the campus. Eighteen ICT-enabled classrooms are equipped with advanced technical facilities. The Central Library, the Principal's office, and other campus areas are secured with HD DVR CCTV cameras. An audio-visual classroom has been established on the second floor of the Central Library building, and the Principal's office employs

updated technology for efficient administrative functions. The college is also moving towards a paperless administration, disseminating notices, guidelines, and circulars electronically.

IT Maintenance and Cyber Security

All computers are connected to an uninterrupted power supply and high-performance servers. Regular updates and maintenance are managed through an Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC). The college adheres to a clear policy for IT upgrades, focusing on updating curriculum-based software and preventing IT malpractices through a Cyber Security Pledge. Last academic year, a seminar was organized during Student's Observance Week to teach students how to navigate academic and scholarship portals safely and effectively.

Despite its financial reliance on the Government of West Bengal and UGC, Falakata College allocates a generous budget for the upgrade and maintenance of its IT infrastructure, ensuring that it meets the highest standards of technological support and educational delivery.

Annual reviews assess the implementation of the strategic plan, research promotion initiatives, the NAAC SSR portal, and an online vulnerability survey among students.

Strategic Planning and Oversight

Initiatives are meticulously planned by the Academic Subcommittee or Teachers' Council, with financial decisions reviewed by the Finance Subcommittee and approved by the Governing Body.

Career Development

To enhance student employability, the college emphasizes career development through the Career Counselling Cell, which facilitates industry interactions and organizes training programs and career workshops under Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives.

Academic and Administrative Audits

Comprehensive oversight involves four layers of auditing:

- 1. **Internal Academic Audits:** Conducted by Heads of Departments (HODs) and the IQAC, authenticated by the Principal.
- 2. External Audits: Performed by external members nominated by the Principal and IQAC, further reviewed by higher education institutions in partnership with the college and the Director of the Malviya Mission Teacher Training Center (formerly UGC-HRDC), University of North Bengal.
- 3. **Internal Administrative Audits:** Reviewed by the Finance Subcommittee to ensure adherence to standards and best practices.

Governance and Administration

As a government institution, Falakata College operates under the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal. Recruitment is managed by the College Service Commission, under the Ministry of Higher Education, while appointments and transfers follow the same protocol. Faculty and

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization
